
# Submission into the

# proposed redistribution of

### Electoral Districts for

## Western Australia

To the members of the Western Australian Redistribution Committee,

Though not a resident of WA, I have been one of literally a handful of regular, private, individual contributors to Electoral Redistributions at both Commonwealth and State/Territory levels since 2013.

This submission draws on those 6 years of experience.

Normally my submissions are detailed, focussing on all elements of a Redistribution – enrolment, District Names and boundaries.

Other priorities have prevented me from being able to dedicate that level of focus for this Redistribution.

However, I do have some comments and suggestions relating to principles which I would like the Redistribution Committee to consider.

#### On the naming of State Electoral Districts

I propose the Redistribution Committee adopts 2 principles – the first is applied at Commonwealth and at some State levels; the second relates to District Naming.

Principle 1 – The names of State Electoral Districts should not duplicate Commonwealth Electoral Division names.

This is to avoid potential voter confusion especially when both Federal and State elections can be held within a short timeframe.

Should the Redistribution Committee adopt this principle it would have to rename the Districts of Fremantle, Moore & Perth.

Following on from that principle it is also logical to apply the same process to avoid duplicity of State Electoral District and Local Government Area (LGA) names. However, the approach here should simply be not to rename or create any new District with a name identical to a current LGA name.

The second principle has been applied at State level in South Australia for many years and was also adopted by Queensland to a significant extent at their 2016 Redistribution.

The reasoning behind the Queensland Redistribution Committee's decision to move from locality-based District Names to names relating to significant people or landmarks follows on the next page. I encourage the Western Australian Redistribution Committee to consider the logic of their Queensland counterparts.

Principle 2 – Significant Landmarks, Geographical Features or the names of prominent Western Australians who have contributed significantly to the State or Commonwealth should be considered in preference to a locality name whenever a new District name is required.

The Commission decided to deviate from the practice of naming electoral districts after towns or suburbs within them, favouring instead the use of the names of significant people or landmarks.

Experience has shown that in time electorates 'move' as their boundaries change, sometimes resulting in a suburb which was formerly central to the district, being outside the electorate, or on its margin. In some of the more densely populated areas, containing several suburbs or localities, it is difficult to see why the name of one suburb should be preferred over that of others.

It is true to observe that landmarks too may cease to be central to an electorate. Where the Commission has opted to name an electorate after a landmark, it has done so in the hope that it will be regarded as easily identifiable with most of the electoral district.

The commissioners have named a number of electorates after people who have contributed significantly to the life of the State. This was more readily done where a person had lived in an area within the electorate, or had performed work which supported the area. In the case of some, whose contribution was thought to be to the whole State (or even the country), the commissioners concluded that such a nexus was not necessarily required. The Commission decided that they would not consider the names of any living or recently deceased person.
