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I write this email on behalf of the Yanchep Two Rocks Community Recreation Association in regards to the proposed changes in the electoral boundaries.

Our Association has been an integral part of the community of Yanchep and Two Rocks, with 2019 marking the 41st year since foundation. Our local Council, Community Groups and Associations have fought hard for many years for Yanchep and Two Rocks to be recognised as towns within the Perth CBD, to have the tourism appeal that we currently have, and to be developed into a hub within the Perth CBD - which we are just starting to see come into fruition.

The proposal for Yanchep and Two Rocks to be moved into the next Northern boundary being the Moore electorate is a kick in the face for the local community here. With longstanding residents, whom have been here before areas such as Butler even existed, the suggestion of being moved to the Moore electorate shows a complete lack of understanding of the hard work that has occurred within this community to be a part of the CBD and to be recognised equally.

The towns of Yanchep and Two Rocks are not rural towns anymore, with infrastructure being developed quickly, train lines being built, new roads and estates, to then put these 2 towns in a rural electorate is absurd.

It would make more sense to move more Southern coastal towns such as Quinns Rocks into the next Southern electorate of Burns Beach - an area where the population will not see major growth and needn't need to be changed again.

The projected growth in population in Yanchep and Two Rocks means that there is a high chance that in the future a new electorate will need to be created purely for these 2 towns and the residents within, why

should these 2 major developing towns in the Perth CBD be moved OUT of the CBD to a rural electorate just to end up being moved back in in the near future?

This goes against everything that the local Council and residents are trying to create which is a town that is a part of Perth, that has much to offer and that attracts people to not only visit but to live - something that has been done very well over the last decade.

To suggest moving Yanchep and Two Rocks to a rural electorate just shows how out of touch the Government of Australia is with it's people. We are not just the name of a town on a piece of paper, but an integral part of the future of Perth and the Coastal Corridor.
